No public comment received. Roger Kregel, Dumont Telephone, was present in-person to discuss a broadband infrastructure partnership with broadband being an eligible expense to use the American Rescue Plan Act funding. Kregel also mentioned the State of Iowa has passed state funding for broadband infrastructure. The State is us-

ing broadband maps to determine underserved areas and Dumont Telephone has applied but not been accepted at this time due to wireless carriers distorting the maps to make underserved areas appear to be served at a certain level. IT Director, Sara Trepp, offered to provide county support as they apply for the state funding. Kregel explained their project area would include the rural areas from Franklin county line in the Geneva area across the southern county line through Aplington, Parkersburg and New Hartford. Additional discussions were held regarding 911 utilizing a fiber network, leasing fiber lines, wireless carriers.

The Board revisited two resolution options for a moratorium prior to new zoning ordinances being passed. Barnett shared his concern with using the special use permit resolution because it may limit too many business opportunities. Planning and Zoning Environmental Health Specialist, Misty Day, stated she has received a call in the past week regarding a potential business that would need to go through the special permit process. Barnett clarified the parts of our zoning ordinances they are making significant changes to, even prior to recent interest, included the alternative en
