CITY OF ALLISON COUNCIL MEETING MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 22ND, 2025

Regular Meeting:
Mayor Pro-tem Bangasser opened the regular meeting of the City of Allison City Council at 5:15 p.m. The Council members present were Bangasser, Galey, Henning, Heuer, Stirling. Absent: Mayor Henrichs. Also, present were Trent Stirling, Coby Bangasser, Joe Conlon, Felicia Schrage, Vicki Schoneman, Dale Schoneman, Mark Bangasser, Don Troyna, Barb Troyna, Wesley Allan, Bryer DeGroote, John Wessels, Landen Wessels, Taylor Wedeking, Derek Hummel, Sara Henrichs, and Ray Bechthold. Galey made a motion to approve the agenda with a second by Bangasser. Ayes: All. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Open Forum:
Felicia Schrage and Vicki Schoneman brought the Cemetery up to the Council to help ensure that everyone was on the same page with having it cleaned up by Veteran's Day (November 11th, 2025).

Council Member Stirling commented that this will be taken care of but asked why there have not been any of these complaints brought to his attention before this. He has received only one complaint regarding a stone that was brought to his attention and taken care of. Some grass is going to get on the stones when they mow, and stones on occasion do get hit with a lawn mower and will be taken care of. Stirling was talked down and so were his employees during the last meeting, and no one talked with him directly or complained to him, which has made this more upsetting. Mike said that the Cemetery will be taken care of, and he will go with the subcommittee that was formed and look at the spots of the cemetery they are referring to along with the stones that are believed to be moved by the mowers. Another issue brought up with the

Cemetery is that people do not follow the rules that are posted at the Cemetery regarding the time frame that they are able to have stuff on the stone and when they cannot. When there are items left by the stone, it makes it more difficult for them to trim around.

The Allison Cemetery Policy and what reads on the sign at the Cemetery is as follows: Flowers, decorations, and containers will be left at the Cemetery at one's own risk. Flowers and decorations are allowed on graves two weeks before and two weeks after Memorial Day. Exception to this policy are saddles & vases attached to stones, hooks, or other base attachments. Flowers will be allowed on new graves for a reasonable time. Custodians will remove any flowers which appear dead, or which violate this policy.

At this time, the Cemetery is being mowed once per week and trimmed every other. If the Council feels that this needs to be done more often, they need to let Stirling Lawn Care know.

Council member Galey brought up that Public Works has cleaned up around the building at the City lot, and that the new policies and procedures have been included with the council packet.

City Hall lawn was also brought up as some of the weeds and grass had gotten tall and not taken care of timely. Public Works has since taken care of this.

Consent Agenda:
Motion by Henning with a second by Heuer to approve the consent agenda as follows:

Approve minutes from the regular meeting on 09/08/2025.

Approve building permit for Tami Ackerson – 712 Cherry Street – Curb cut for wider driveway.

Ayes: All. Nays: None. Motion carried.

New Business:
The council was presented with sealed bids to open for the farmland. The bids were as follows: Bryer DeGroote \$275/acre, Taylor

and Andrea (Schrage) Wedeking \$325/acre, Landen & Abigail Wessels \$325/acre, Wesley Allan \$300/acre, and Hummel Farms \$285/acre,

Those who bid on the farmland were given the opportunity to increase their bids by increments of \$5.00. During this time, Bryer DeGroote increased his bid to \$330/acre, then Landen Wessels increased their bid to \$335/acre, and it went back and forth between DeGroote and Wessels until it ended with Landen Wessels making the final bid of \$385/acre.

Motion by Heuer with a second by Henning to approve Landen & Abigail Wessels with the winning bid at \$385/acre for the lease of the farmland for the next 2 years. Ayes: All. Nays: None. Motion Carried.

The Council discussed Trick – or – Treating as there were some residents who requested Saturday for the day for this instead of Friday night. However, the Council felt that Halloween is when Trick – or – Treating should be held and made the decision to have Trick – or – Treating on October 31st from 5-7 p.m.

Motion by Stirling with a second by Galey to have Trick – or – Treating on Friday, October 31st from 5-7 p.m. Ayes: All. Nays: None. Motion Carried.

The 2018A General Capital Loan Note for the Original Long term camping loop at Wilder Park only has \$15,000.00 left in principle to pay off. After talking with the City's Financial Advisor, Chip Schultz, it was decided that it would be a good time to pay this off in it's entirety on the December 1st, 2025, due date as the Park generated a little over \$50,000 more in revenue than budgeted in last year's Fiscal Year.

Motion by Henning with a second by Bangasser to pay off the 2018A General Capital Loan Note for the Original Long term camping loop at Wilder Park. Ayes: All. Nays: None. Motion Carried.
Old Business:

City Engineer Zeb Stanbrough, representing Clapsaddle Garber, e-mailed an update to the Council regarding the street project. He let them know that curb and gutter installation was completed by Schrock last week, Heartland finished fine grading on 5th and 3rd and they are working on 9th this week, Milling for HMA patches were completed Monday the 22nd, and Ted from Heartland let them know that their plan is to pave this Thursday or early next week depending on weather.

Along with the street project updates, seal coat patches were discussed as the Council had talked about filling them with 3in asphalt as Heartland does not offer seal coating. However, after further discussion it was decided that it had already been agreed that seal coat would not be filled with asphalt as the patches should be filled according to the condition of the street. Public Works Director, Trent Stirling, is going to contact Mark Stefes at Blacktop Services to come in and quote what it would cost to seal coat the 5 patches that are on seal coat roads. Trent will also be pricing what it would cost to fill these patches with cold patch so that the Council can compare the pricing and decide how they would like to move forward.

The new water meter system is still having some issues regarding the MIU numbers not showing up in Neptune as they should; that being said, City Administrator/City Clerk Alexis Wiegmann and Deputy Clerk Chris Graser, are working with GWORKS and Neptune to handle this issue.

CITY OF CLARKSVILLE CITY COUNCIL DEPARTMENT MEETING

September 22, 2025

The Clarksville City Council met in regular session on September 22, 2025 in the City Council Chambers at 6:30 p.m. with Mayor Jerald Heuer presiding and Council Members Ruth Saulsbury, Roger Doty, Jennifer Kielman and Jessi Reints (by phone and then in person @ 6:58pm). Taran Sherburne was absent. The following Department Heads & employees were in attendance: Molly Bohlen, City Clerk, Jared Brunner, Maintenance, Kristen Clark, librarian, John Wehling, Ambulance, Rebecca Brown, Reserve Officer, and Barry Mackey, Police Chief.

Motion Kielman, Doty to approve agenda for September 22, 2025. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Motion Saulsbury, Kielman to Open Public Hearing to accept input on a special permit for 1021 South Main St. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Receive comments-written, oral, for or against.

Reints just has a concern regarding safety around the area especially where there is a lot of traffic around the park/diamonds, making sure that the stop signs have clear view. Heuer states that we could let Mr. Ragsdale know of the concern

for the safety in the area as well. Mayor declares Public Hearing Closed.

Motion Doty, Kielman to close the Public Hearing for the Special Permit. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Motion Kielman, Saulsbury to approve Special Permit for dealership at 1021 South Main St. with provisions of maintaining ample parking area and line of sight at the corner for safety. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Doty states that many people want stop signs, but he wonders whether or not yield signs vs stops signs would help at all. There are many people that are complaining about individuals running stops signs and ramping vehicles over intersections. Mackey states that he is not able to be everywhere and if he is on one side of town a lot of times people avoid the area. Brunner is going to see what he has for signs at the shop and maybe do a trial run with the yield signs. Saulsbury wonders if the stop sign committee needs to have a meeting again. Heuer states that he has talked to 6-8 people in town and half are for adding stop signs and the other half are against adding more signs.

Mayor Topics: Heuer wants to remind Council of Employee Reviews that are past due and upcoming. Kielman states that she will get together with Sherburne to get them

done.

Motion Kielman, Doty to approve Consent Agenda of: August Monthly Expenditures & Reports, Minutes from 09/08/2025. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Department Head Updates: Library: Clark provided stats and report for August, upcoming programs for adults and kids as well as Monday Fun Days. Heuer questions if numbers have increased on Mondays with there not being any school and Clark states that it has and will be interesting to see what the numbers do for the next few Mondays. Fire Dept.: Auxiliary is having a pork loin supper fundraiser on October 11th.

Ambulance: Provided updates on new piece of equipment that was purchased with donations, as well as the new technology it will provide. Wehling states that a new cell phone, hot spot were also purchased due to them not functioning as intended. He is also looking into different phone providers that would support capability to transmit data from the new device to the facility that they are traveling to. Wehling also mentioned that the Fire Department/Ambulance are hosting open houses/recruitment day on October 8th to help with gaining volunteers for their services. Police Chief provided report with calls totaling 123 for August. Reserve Officer Brunner wanted to thank council and let them know that she

received her body armor recently and it will help to keep her safe and protected. She does have some small accessories to purchase to aid in removing items from her belt up to the vest.

Maintenance: Building Permits:

1. Taya Jacobs: 202 W Jefferson St.; adding front deck to enter house. Heuer states that the drawing provided is not quite accurate and he did talk with the homeowner about how far out they would be able to come. Brunner states that he also spoke with homeowner and recommended lining up with the rest of the houses on the street. Motion Doty, Reints to approve building permit as presented by Maintenance. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

2. Todd Dreesman: 121 W. Poial St.; removing old sidewalk and adding larger concrete between house & garage. Motion Doty, Saulsbury to approve building permit as presented by Maintenance. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Brunner provided a report from the Clean up days which included the fees to dispose of garbage, tires, and waste from the week. Discussed pros and cons from the week, but that it is a good service provided to the community. Heuer feels this is a service that should be continued.

Jendro Rate Changes discus-

sion. Clerk checked on the fuel surcharge per Doty's request-this has been removed from the monthly bills. Clerk states that council had not increased resident's fee for garbage since the garbage fund has the funds to support that.

Motion Reints, Kielman to approve the Jendro rate increase without increasing the rates to residents. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Motion Kielman, Reints to approve contribution of \$100 to Butler County Wellbeing to benefit the residents of Clarksville through programs that are offered. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Motion Reints, Saulsbury, to approve Second Reading of Ordinance No. 319 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE, IOWA BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO WATER RATES. RCV/Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Reints, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Sherburne.

Discussion about planting oak tree starters on buy out properties for future plantings in town. Heuer states that he has been talking with Keith Becker about the DNR program that sells small starter trees for a small amount of money. The idea would be to get some trees growing at the buy out properties

in order to use in the city ROW but possibly for homeowners on their properties as well. Doty questioned whether we could use the buy out for this or not-Clerk will check into and verify. Heuer states that he also spoke with Meredith Borchardt and she states that other towns have tried this and some have seen success while others have not.

Discussion regarding Butler County Board for new county shed. Butler County is wanting to build a larger shed for storing equipment. A piece of property owned by the City was brought up. Doty feels this is a good idea, but questions what they are going to do with their old building and maybe if the City has a need we could make a trade. Brunner states that he could utilize more space for storing of equipment especially during the winter months. Maintenance could utilize the space to complete repairs or general maintenance without having to move equipment in/out of a different shed. John Riherd and Jeff Kolb will be at a future meeting to answer questions regarding this location and the logistics.

Motion Doty, Kielman to adjourn the regular City Council Meeting at 7:30 p.m. Ayes: Saulsbury, Doty, Sherburne, and Kielman. Nays: None. Absent: Reints.
